She has a B.A degree and a Master of Professional Communication degree from Westminster College. Nancy represents District 6.

Ronald Bartee: Mr. Bartee is currently the customer Relations Manager for Larry H. Miller Toyota. He was formerly a parole officer and Chairman of the Parole Board from 1983 to 1996. His Criminal Justice career began as a military police officer, after he graduated from the University of Nebraska at Omaha.
