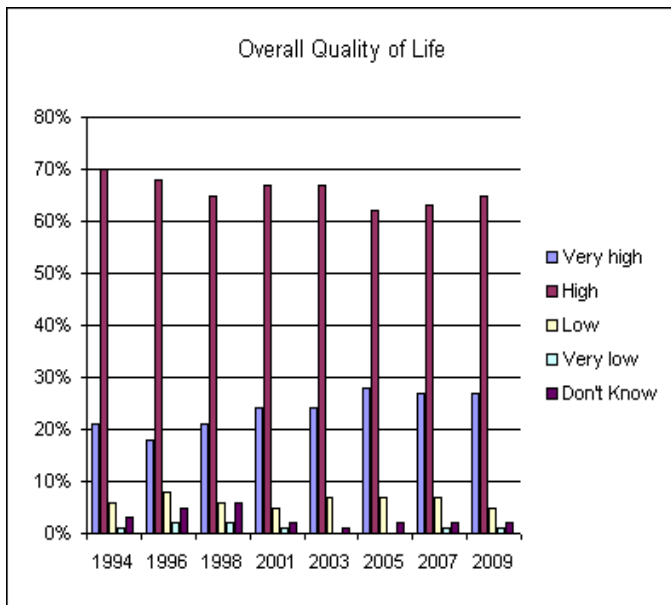
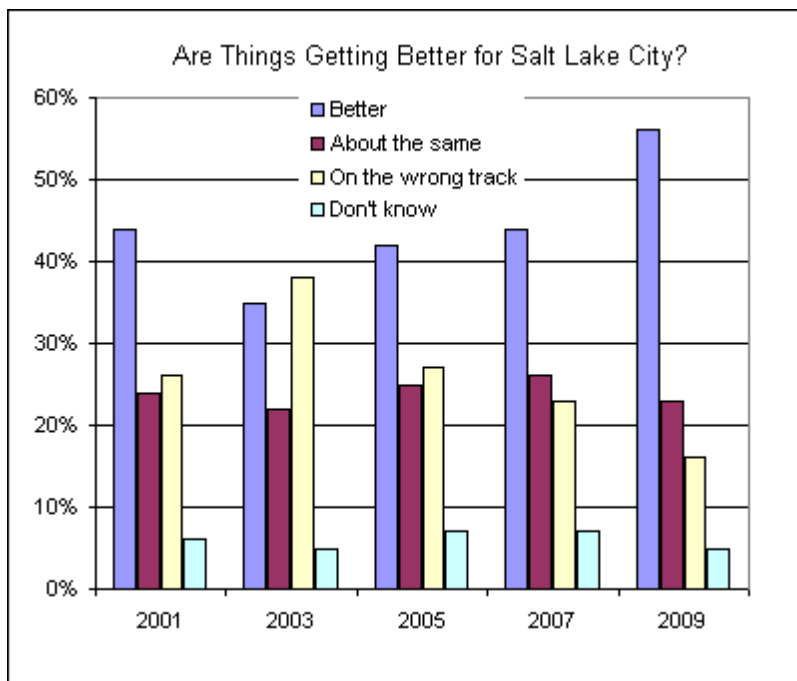


CURRENT ISSUES



Q: How would you rate your overall quality of life?

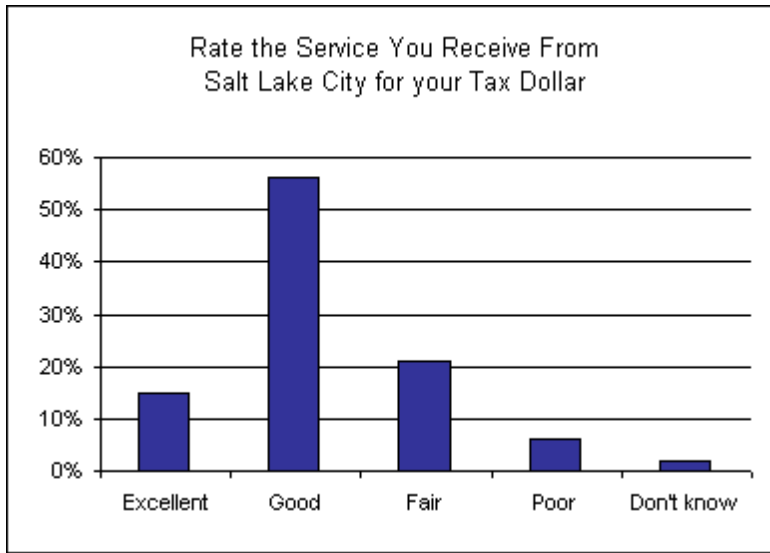
Survey conclusion: the survey participants feel strongly that the quality of life in Salt Lake City is high



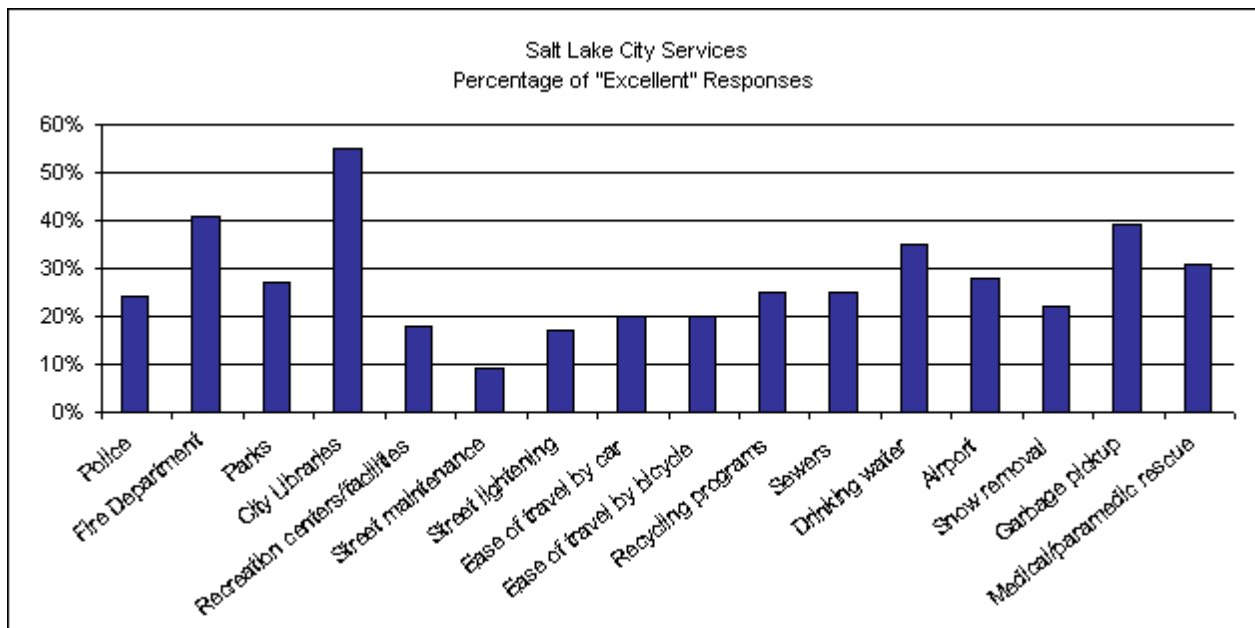
Q: Do you believe that things are getting better for Salt Lake City or are they getting off on the wrong track?

CITY SERVICES

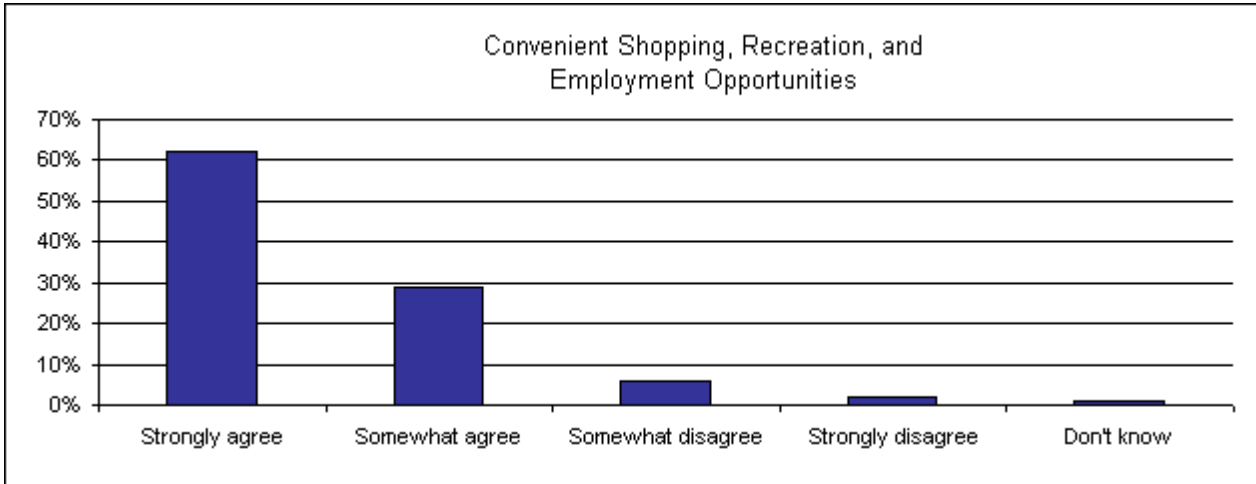


Q: How do you rate the service you receive from Salt Lake City for your tax dollar?
 Survey conclusion: the majority of the participants feel the level of service for their tax dollar is good.

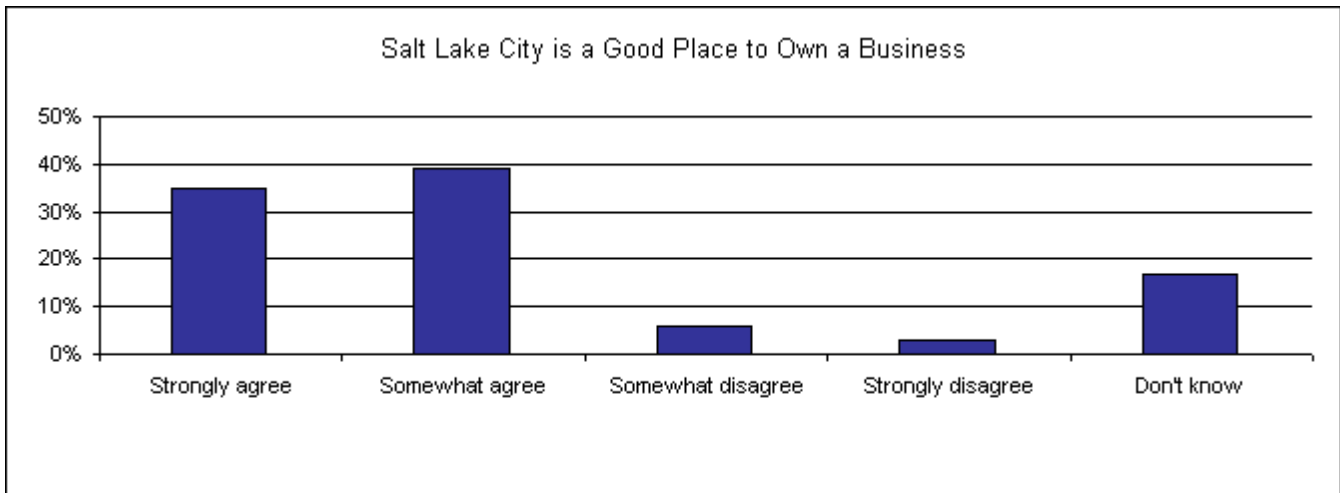

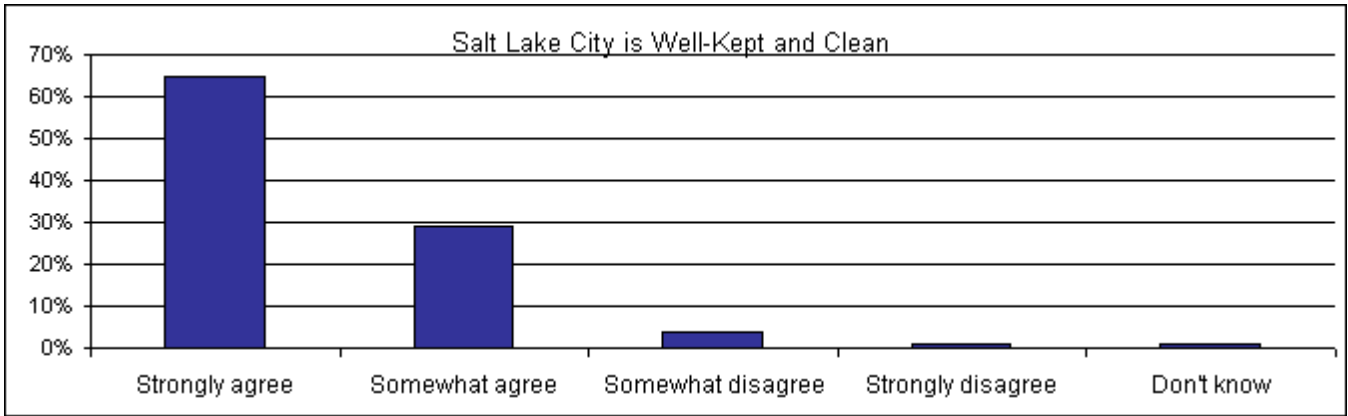
Survey conclusion: the "excellent" responses illustrate that the survey participants rate the library as the most favored service while showing strong support for fire, garbage pickup, airport and drinking water.



Q: I can find convenient shopping, recreation, and employment opportunities in Salt Lake City.
 Survey conclusion: survey participants strongly agree that there are convenient shopping, recreation and employment opportunities in Salt Lake City.

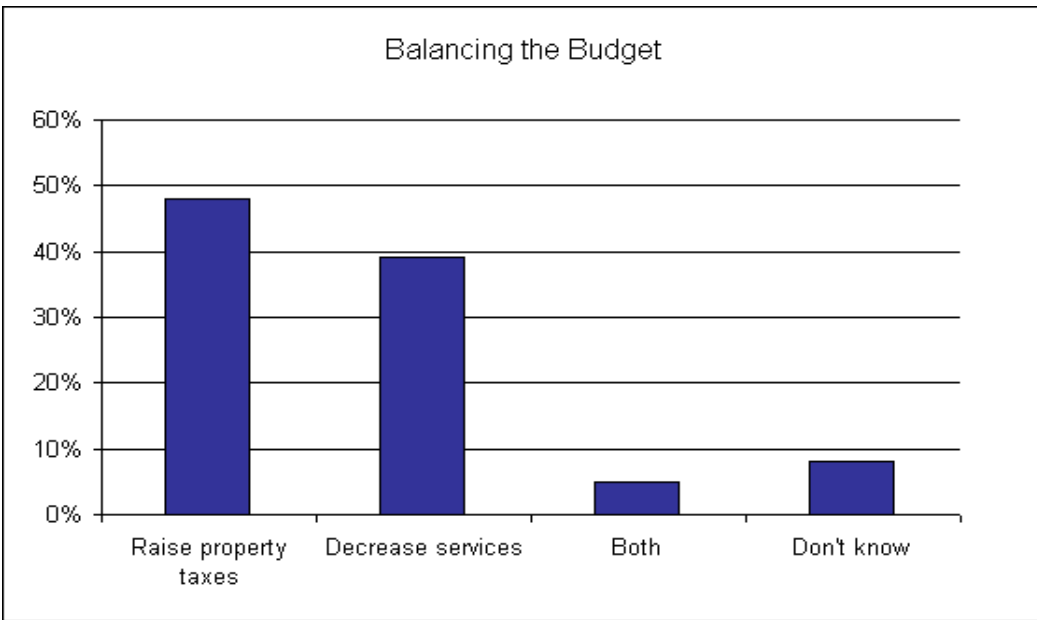


Q: Is Salt Lake City is a good place to own a business?
 Survey conclusion: survey participants strongly/somewhat agree that Salt Lake City is a good place to own a business.



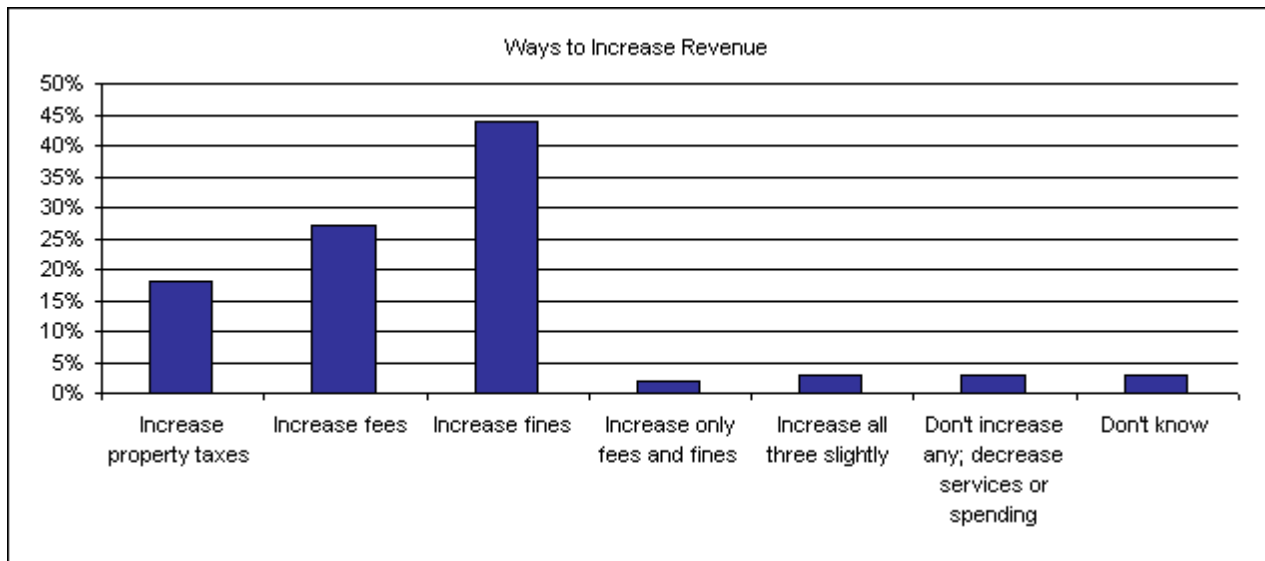
Q: Is Salt Lake City a clean, well-kept city?

Survey conclusion: survey participants strongly agree that the city is well-kept and clean.



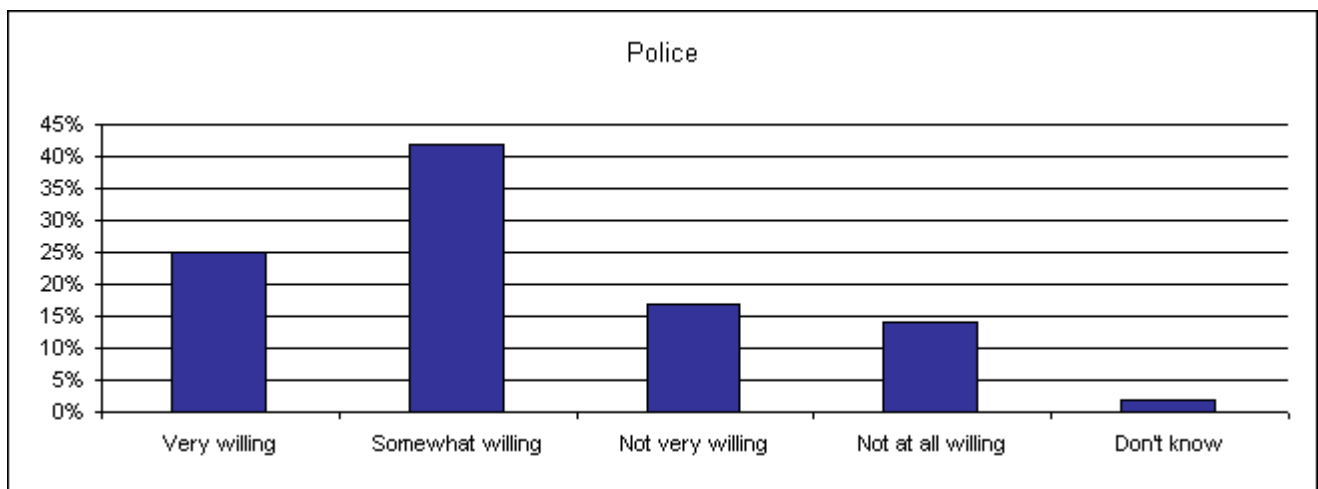
Q: Salt Lake City is required by law to balance its budget. Current financial conditions may mean the budget will be off as much as 10% for the coming year. In order to address this challenge, would you prefer to: raise property taxes, decrease services (both or don't know)?

Survey conclusion: out of the two choices, survey participants are in favor of either raising property taxes or decreasing services to balance the budget.



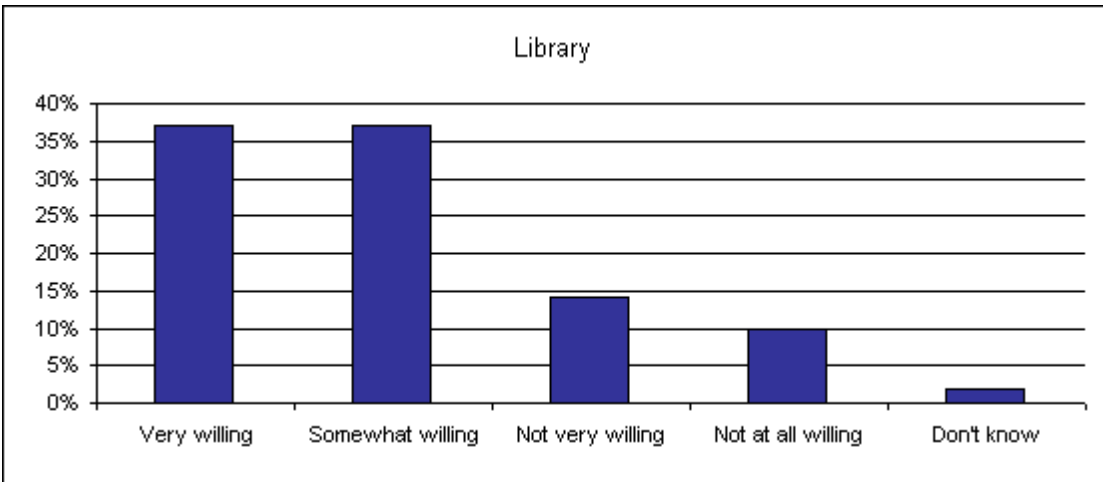
Q: Salt Lake City can only increase City revenue through an increase in property taxes, fines, or fees paid for specific services, such as garbage collection. If the City has to increase revenue, would you prefer they increase property taxes, increase fees or increase fines?

Survey conclusion: survey participants favor increase fines to generate revenue – an increase property taxes was less favored out of the three choices



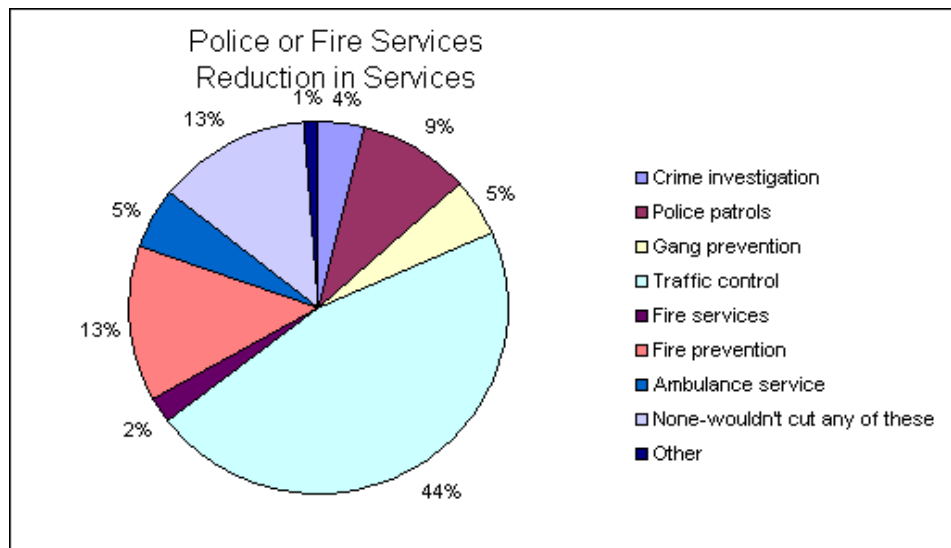
Q: How willing would you be to support a property tax increase if it allowed the city to increase services in the Police Department?

Survey Conclusion: approx. 65 % of survey participants are very willing/somewhat willing to pay a property tax increase for police services.



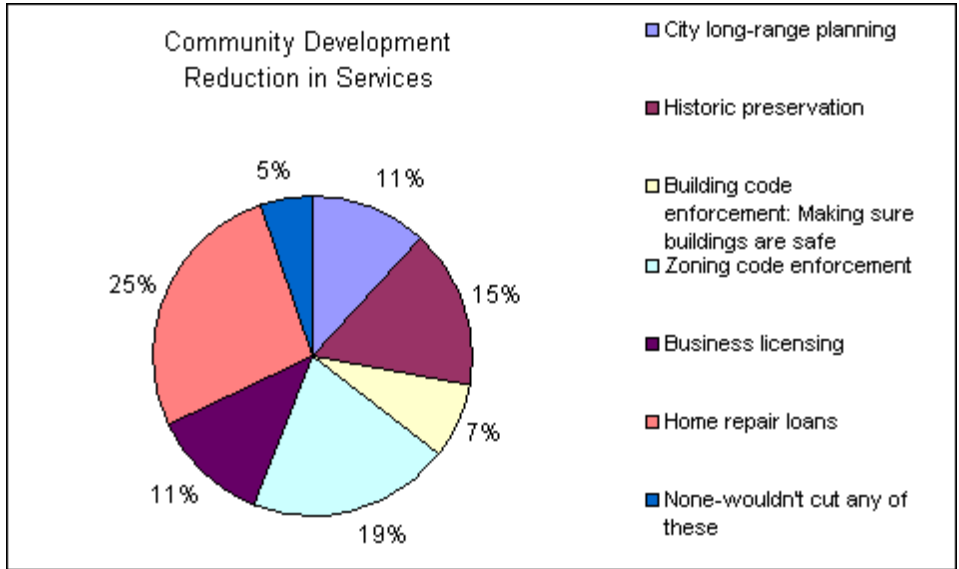
Q: How willing would you be to support a property tax increase if it allowed the city to increase services for the Library system?

Survey conclusion: over 70% of survey participants are very/somewhat willing to pay a property tax increase for library services

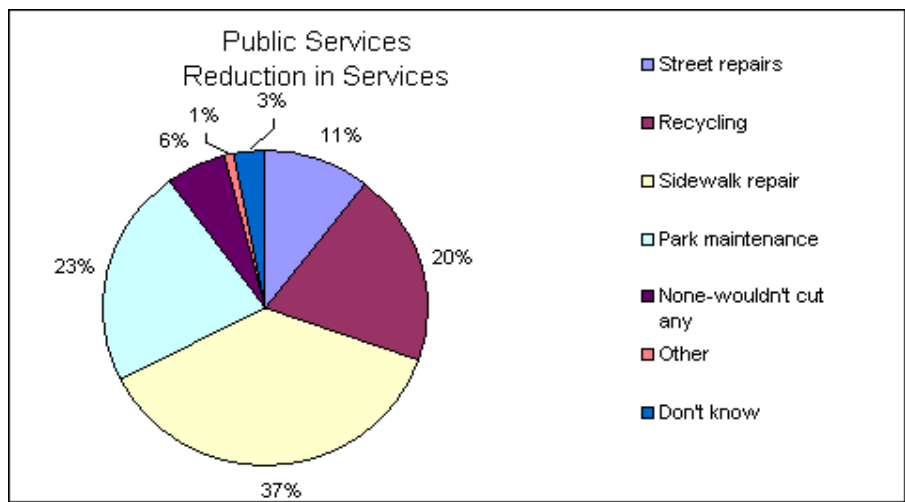


Q: Considering the Police & Fire departments, where do you think it would be best to make reductions?

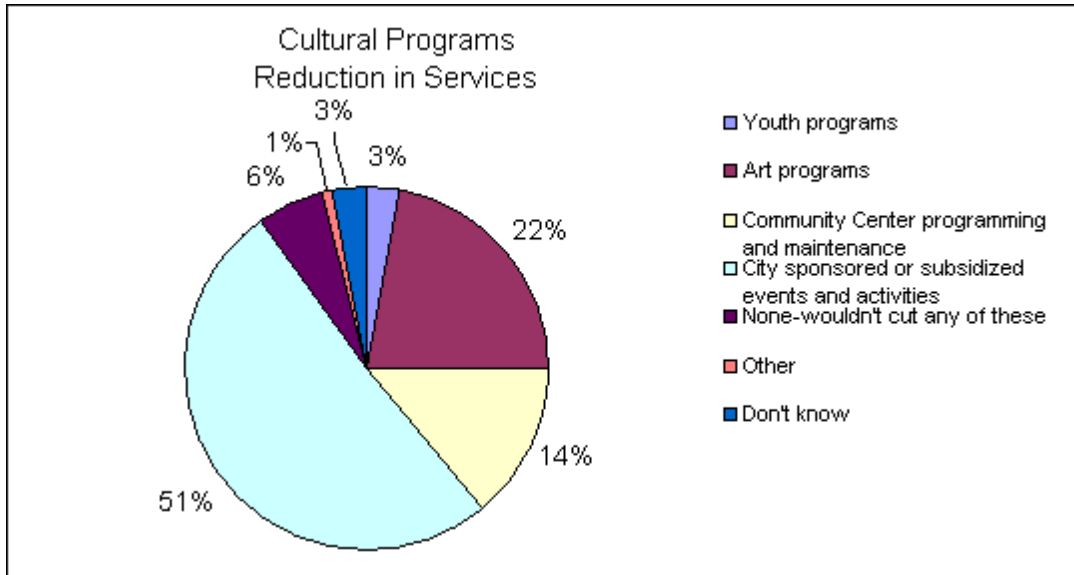
Survey conclusion: participants are most willing to have reductions in traffic control and were equal in their feelings to have reduction in fire prevention and/or no cuts in this dept.



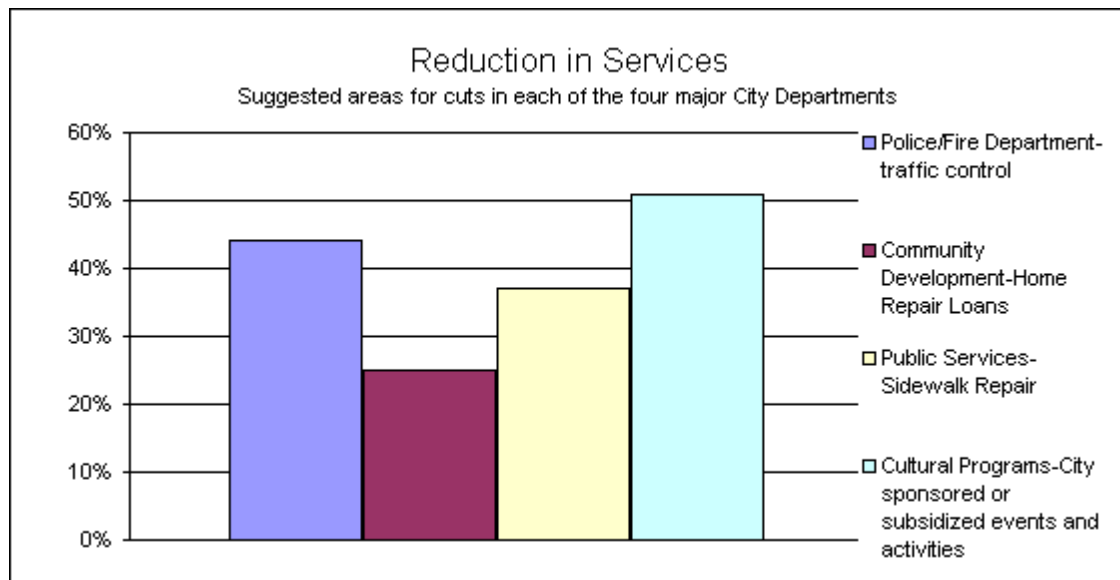
Q: Considering the Community Development Department, where do you think it would be best to make reductions?
 Survey conclusion: participants are most willing to have reductions in home repair loans & zoning code enforcement



Q: Considering the Public Services Department, where do you think it would be best to make reductions?
 Survey conclusion: participants are most willing to have reductions in sidewalk repair, park maintenance and recycling

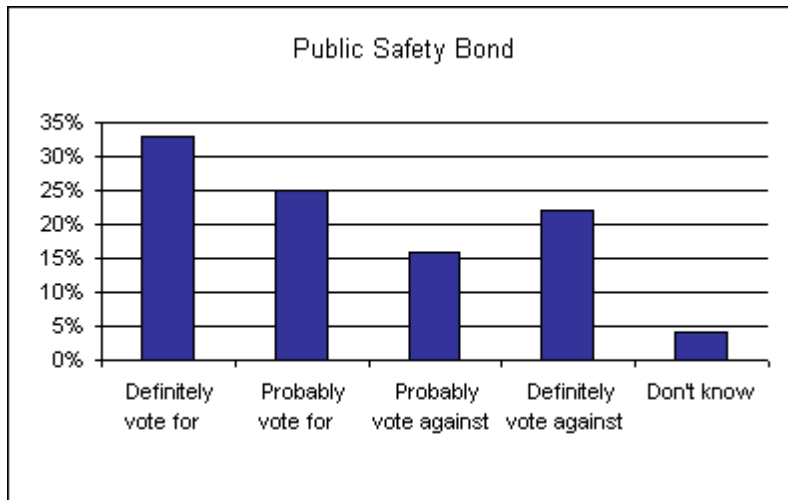


Q: Considering the Cultural programs, where do you think it would be best to make reductions?
 Survey conclusion: participants are most willing to have reductions in city-sponsored or subsidized events and activities with the second favored reduction being the art programs.



Q: Considering the four major departments in city government we've just covered, where do you think it would be best to make reductions?

Survey conclusion: survey participants favored the following cuts for each department: Police/fire-traffic control; Community Development-home repair loans; Public Services-sidewalk repair; Cultural Programs-city sponsored or subsidized events and activities.

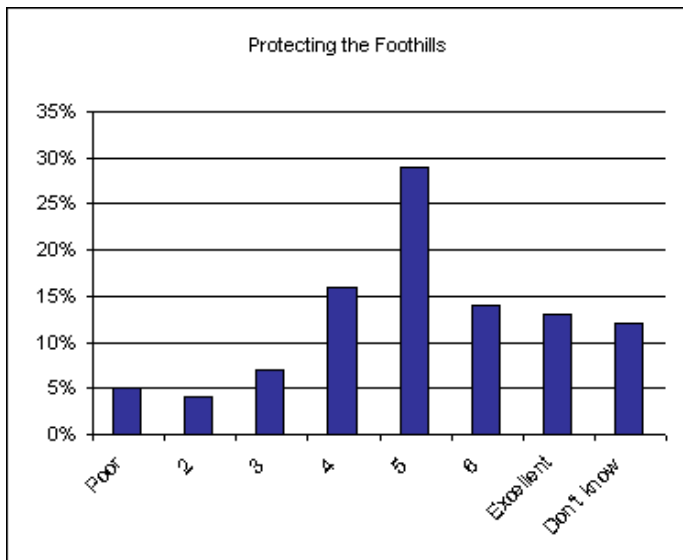


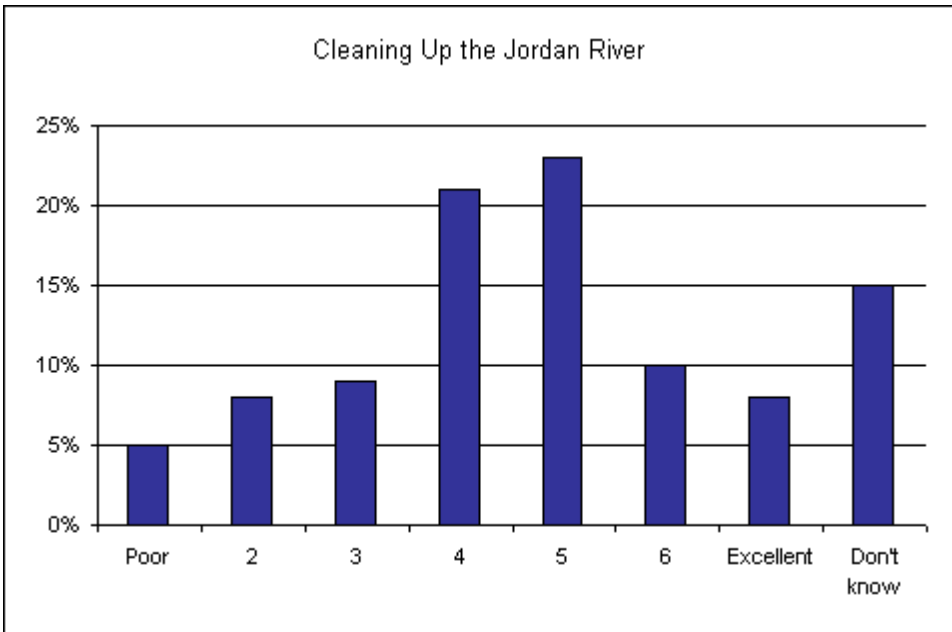
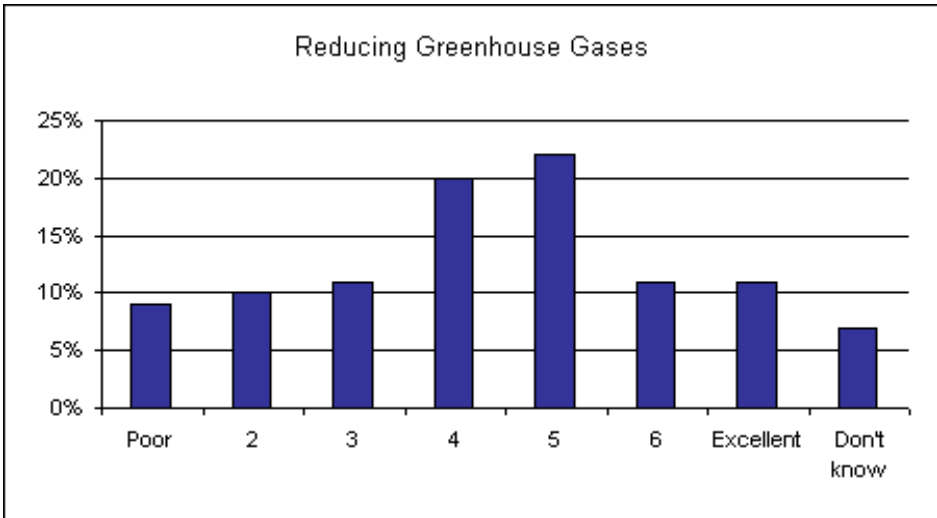
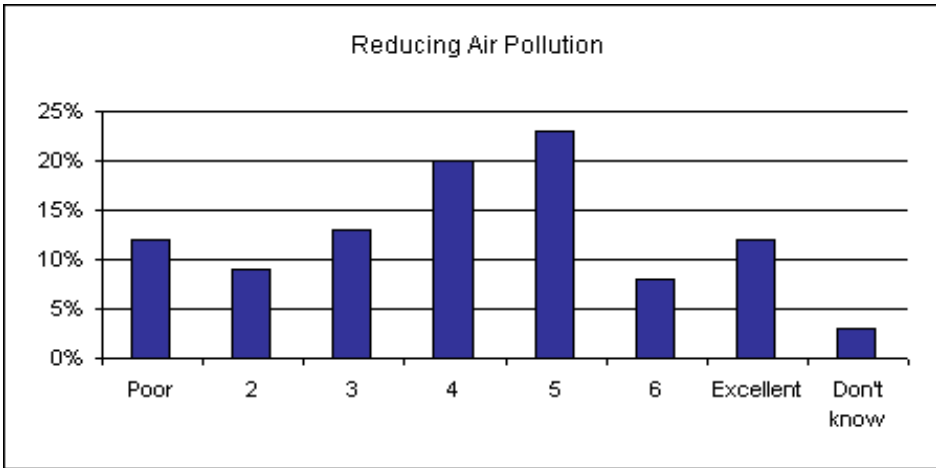

 Survey conclusion: 33 percent would definitely vote and 25 percent would not probably vote; while 22 percent would not vote for a public safety bond.

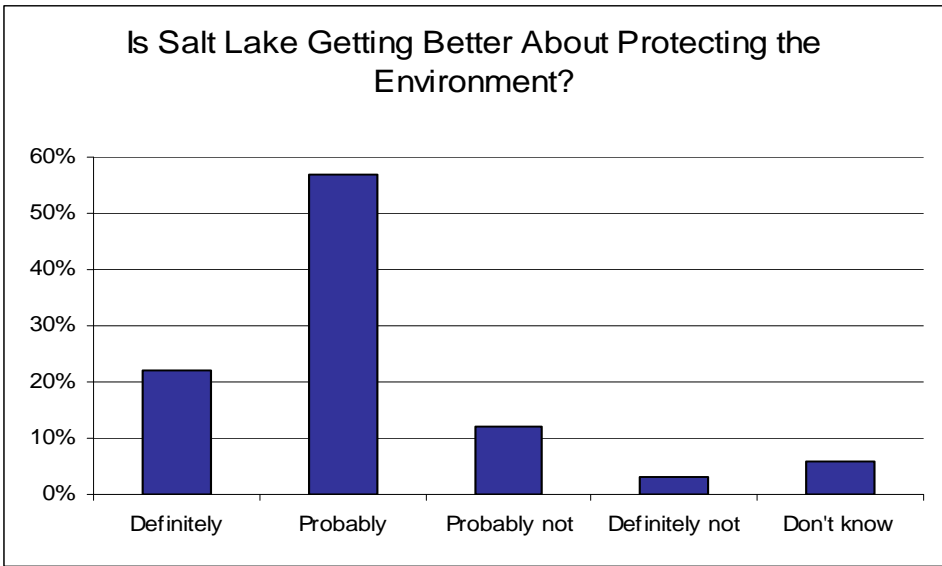
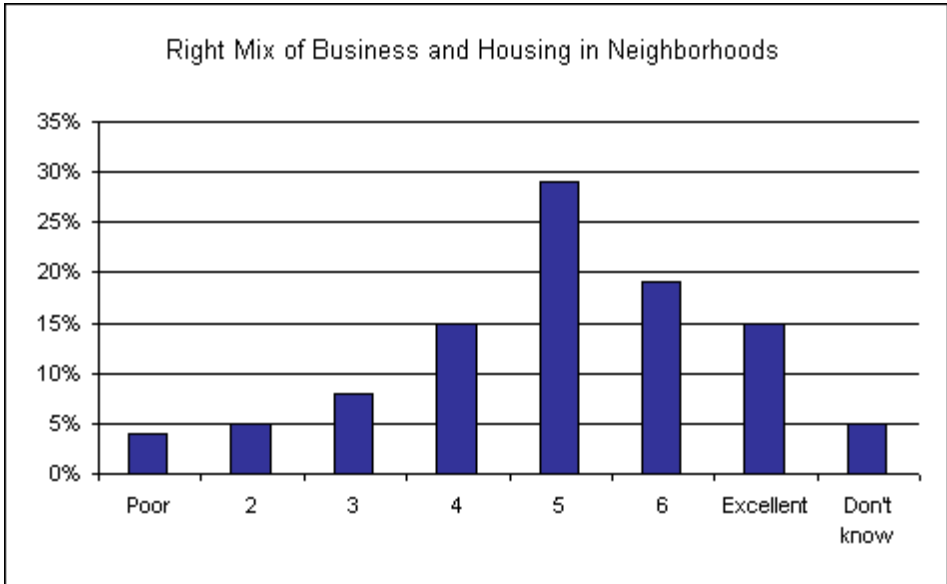
ENVIRONMENT

Survey conclusion: the rankings are good/average for all categories listed

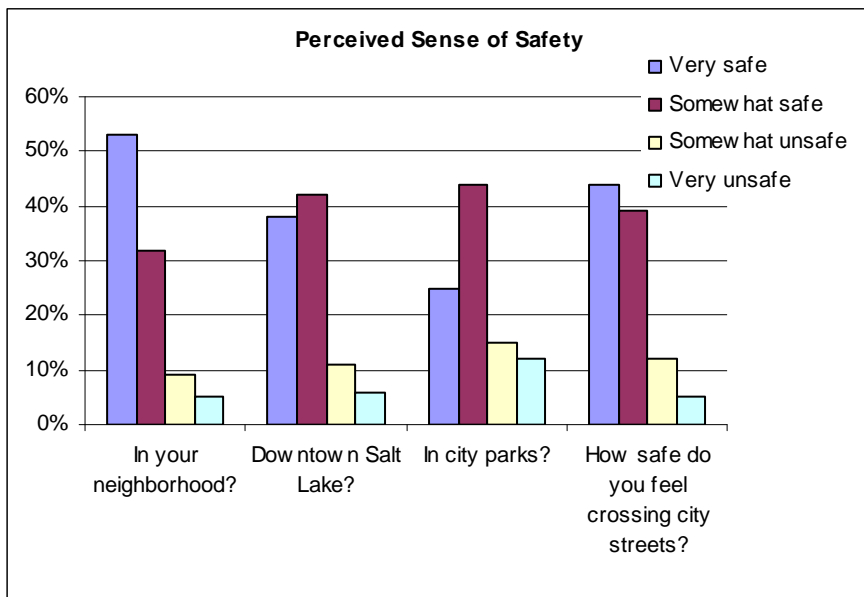






Q: Is the City of Salt Lake getting better about protecting the environment?
 Survey conclusion: There is a large majority of survey participants who feel that Salt Lake City is probably getting better about protecting the environment.

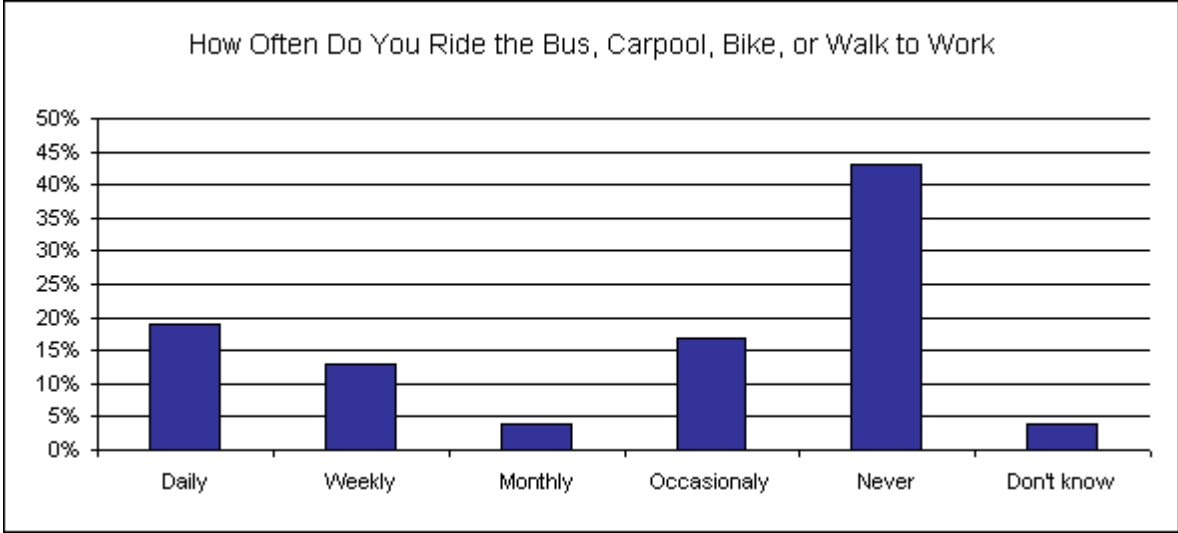
SAFETY



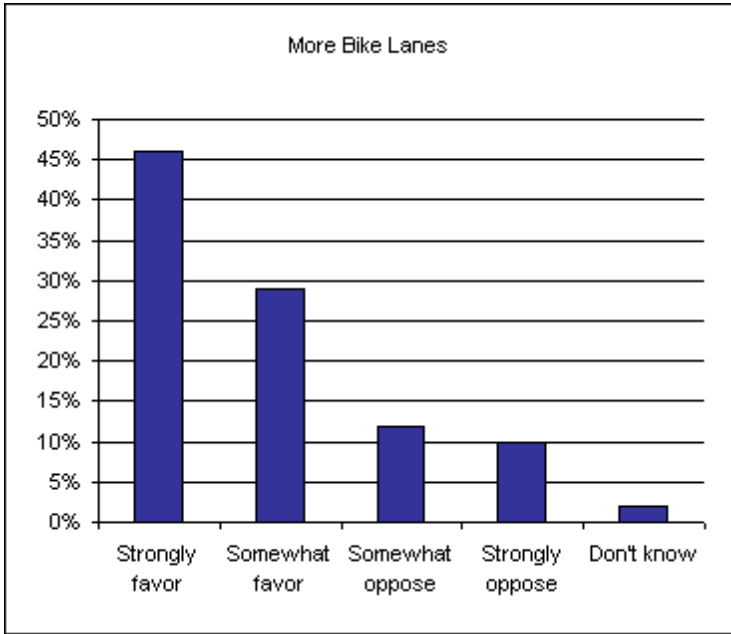
Q: Questions were asked of the participants regarding their perceived sense of safety in their neighborhood, downtown Salt Lake, city parks, and crossing a city street.

TRANSPORTATION



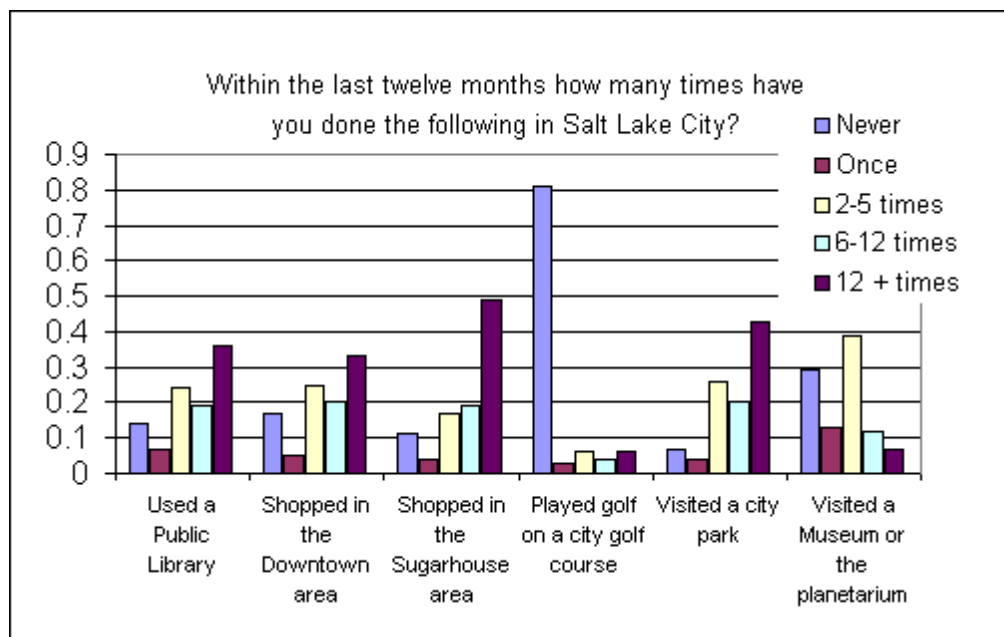
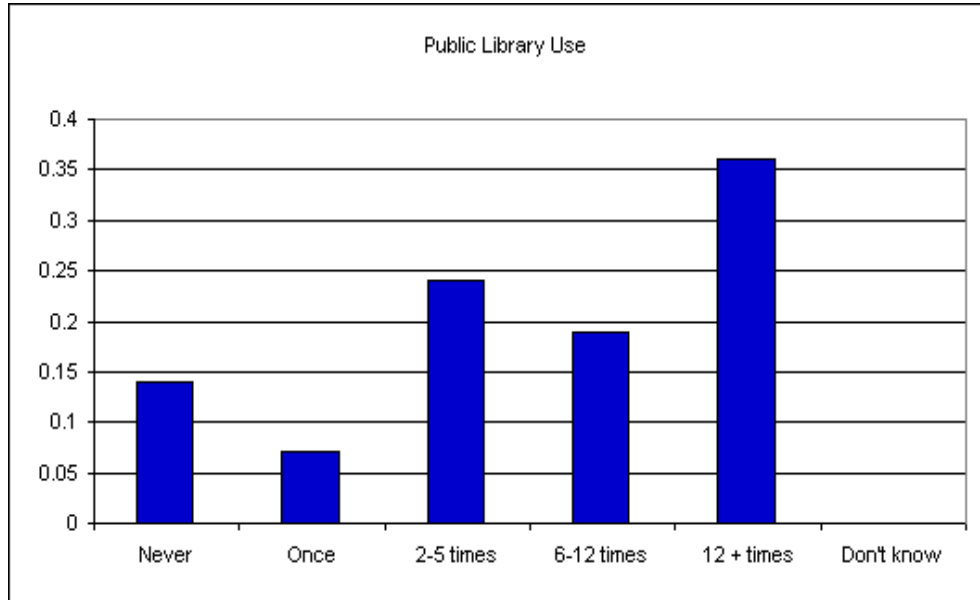
Q: How often do you ride the bus, carpool, bike, or walk to work?
Survey conclusion: Most people never ride, carpool or walk to work

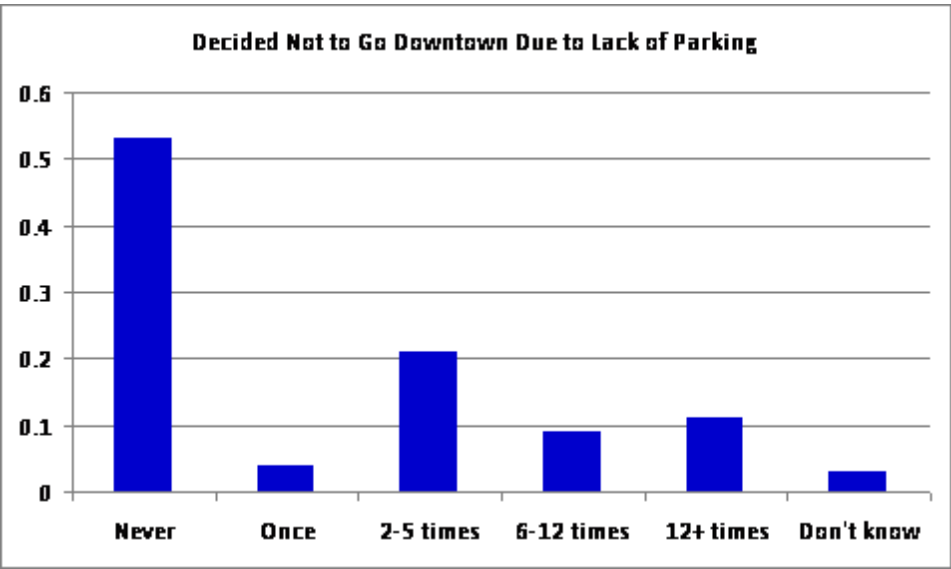


Q: Do you favor or oppose more bike lanes in Salt Lake City?

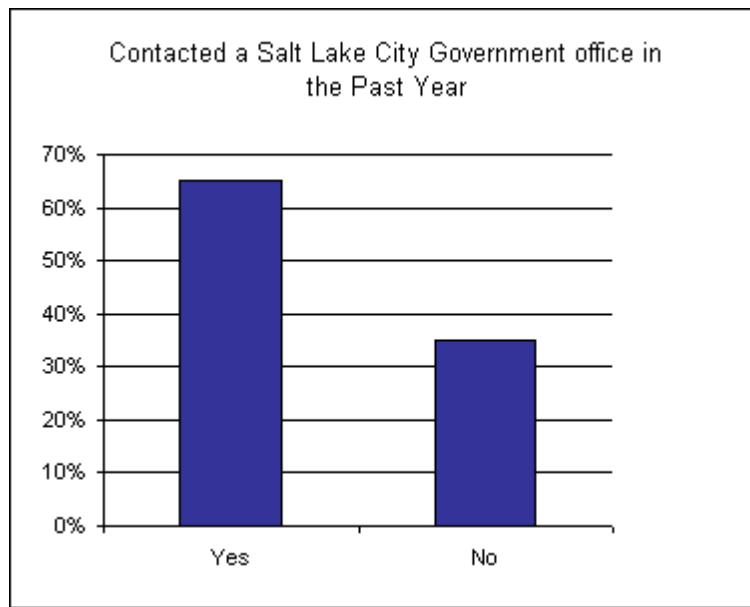


CITY EMPLOYEE

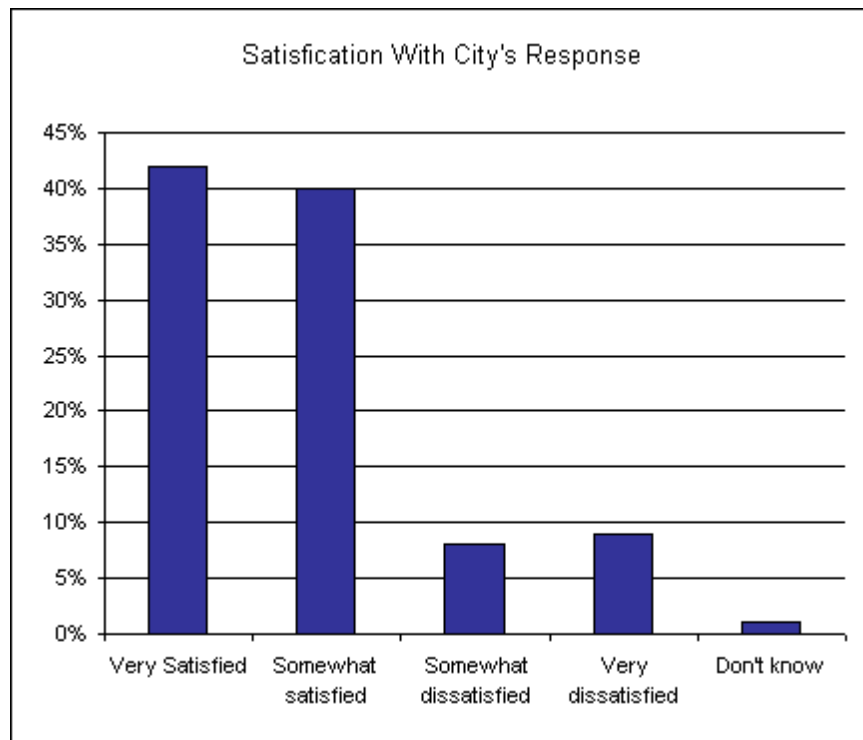


Q: Overall, how would you rate the professionalism of SLC employees?

Survey conclusion: Majority of participants give City employees a high rating

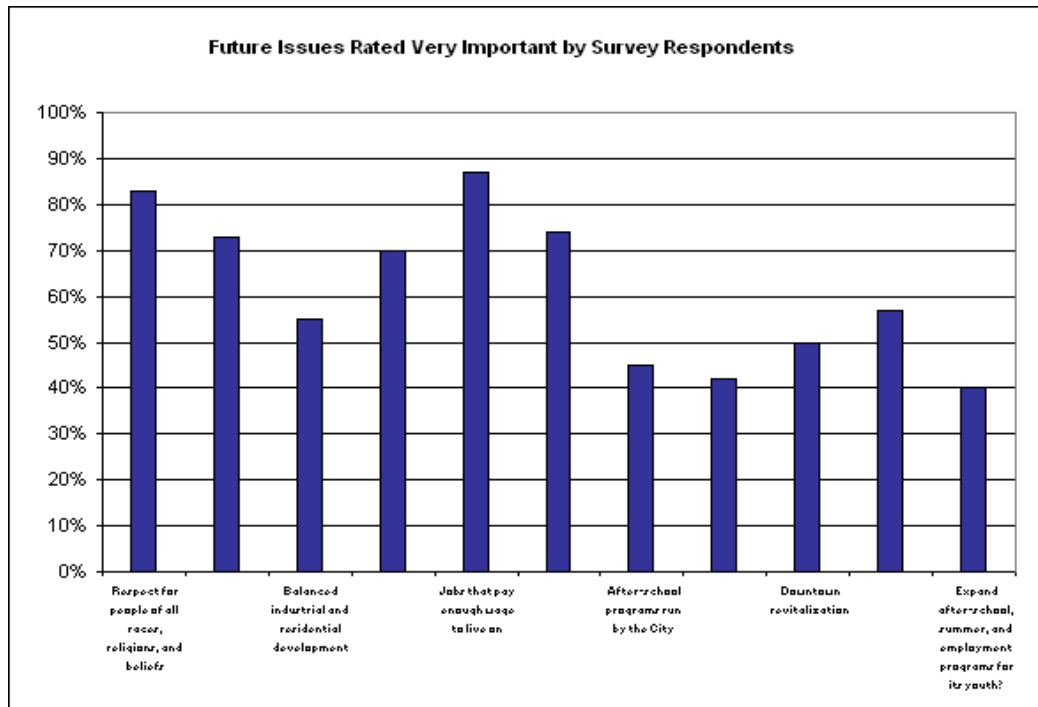


Q: During the past year, have you contacted a Salt Lake City government office to get information, file a complaint or obtain services?
 Survey conclusion: approximately 65 percent of participants have contacted a city employee in the past year.

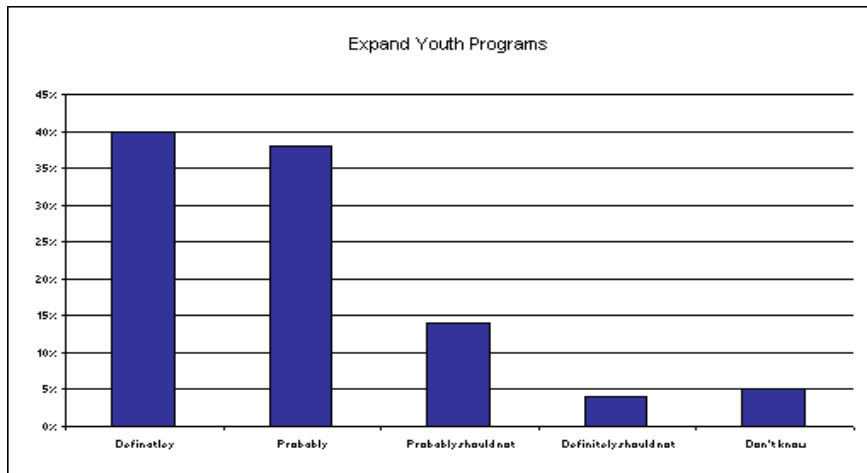


Q: Overall were you satisfied or dissatisfied with the City's response?

Survey conclusion: somewhat/to very satisfied with the manner the City responded

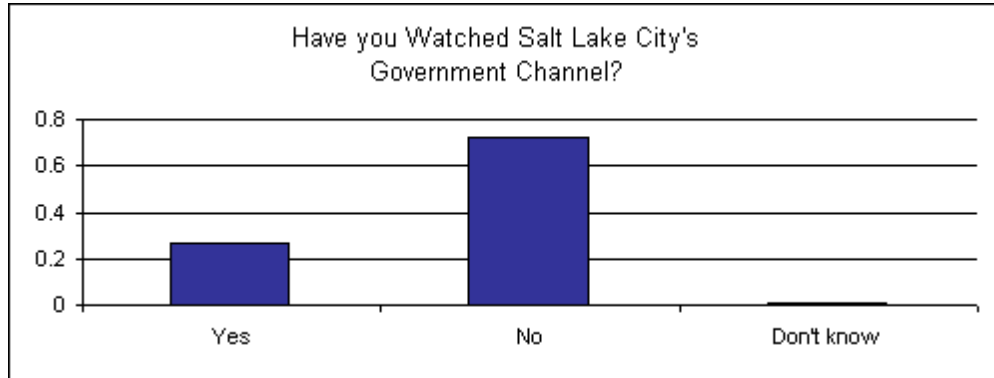


Q: How important do you feel the following issues are to your vision of Salt Lake City's future?

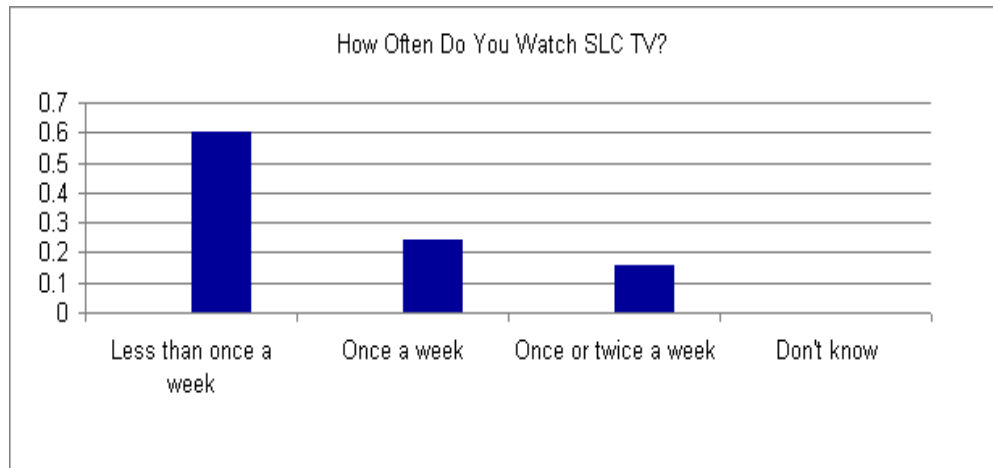


Q: In your opinion, should the city expand its after-school, summer, and employment programs for its youth?
 Survey conclusion: survey participants said definitely/probably.

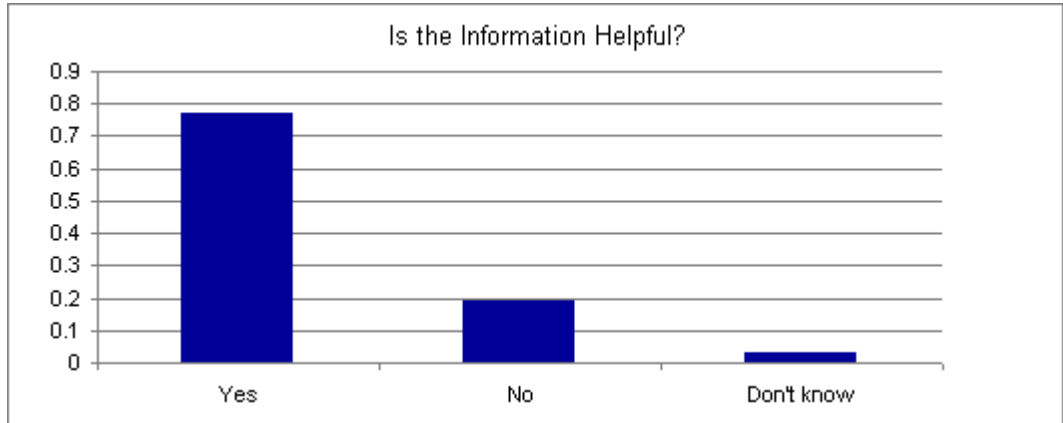
INFORMATION
